Our Mission of Help and Hope Reaches Thousands in South Milwaukee

Receiving no taxpayer funding, South Milwaukee Human Concerns (SMHC) delivers vital services to thousands of low income South Milwaukee residents because of the support we receive from area individuals and businesses. In 2016 we served more than 9,000 South Milwaukee residents – about 40% of those who live in the city. SMHC relies on volunteers and donations.

Over the last five years, the number of South Milwaukee residents who receive our essential services has grown. In 2012, we helped 2,266 residents; 2013, 2,502; 2014, 2,931; 2015, 6,160; 2016, 9,729. These unduplicated/unique clients represent many children. This year, we are on track to eclipse 2016's record-breaking numbers.

Personal Grooming Items in Short Supply, Please Donate



Donations of personal hygiene items are especially needed to assist our thousands of clients, which include many school-age children. South Milwaukee Human Concerns (SMHC) core mission is to provide emergency food and clothing; however many of our clients also need basic items for daily living that help ensure a clean and healthy start for work or school. Particularly needed are:

- Bar soap and body washShampoo and conditioner
- Shave cream and disposable razors
- Toothpaste and toothbrushes
- Deodorant
- Feminine hygiene products

"We try and serve our clients holistically and that includes meeting their food, clothing and personal grooming needs," said Deb DeBoer, SMHC director. DeBoer said too often hygiene items are in short supply, which can force families living at or near poverty to make difficult purchasing decisions. "What families need to get through the day encompasses a wide range of needs," DeBoer said. Bring your donated personal grooming items to SMHC during open hours.

Changes in Center Open Hours Starts December 4

Starting Monday, December 4, open hours for South Milwaukee Human Concerns (SMHC) will change.

New hours: Monday, noon – 3 p.m. • Wednesday, 4 – 6 p.m. • Thursday, 9 – 11 a.m. and 1 – 3 p.m.

Friday, 9 a.m. – noon • Last Saturday of the month, 10 a.m. – noon

Note that the center will be closed on Tuesdays; the Thursday and last Saturday of the month hours will be unchanged from current open times. With the new hours, the center remains open the same number of hours per week. The change is being made to better ensure adequate volunteer staffing and to have a dedicated day (Tuesdays) to more fully address center restocking and administrative functions.

Transition to 'MyPlate' Model Promotes Healthier Food Choices

Under the guidance of Hunger Task Force, the major food donor partner of South Milwaukee Human Concerns, a transition has been made to "MyPlate," a teaching model that encourages healthy eating by those who rely on food pantries.

Hunger Task Force representatives completed detailed presentations to SMHC staff and volunteers about the initiative. Hunger Task Force then assisted SMHC in the transition to the adoption of the new nutritional operation policy, which included a client education program, promotion of fresh food options and more. MyPlate is a healthy eating program emphasizing fruits, vegetables, grains, proteins and dairy as the component parts of a more nutritional healthy lifestyle.
