South Milwaukee Human Concerns partners with Hunger Task Force and Feeding America Eastern Wisconsin to help fulfill its mission of help and hope for South Milwaukee residents. A recent Map the Meal Gap study by Feeding America puts Wisconsin's food insecurity rate at 10.5% of its population. That translates to almost 120,000 people in Milwaukee County. SMHC fills that critical gap in South Milwaukee, serving about 7,000 unduplicated clients annually, including many seniors and children.

SMHC Director DeBoer Honored for 20 Years (and counting) of Service to the City

Debra DeBoer, director of South Milwaukee Human Concerns since 2016 and an assistant at the center for the 12 years prior, was recognized for her 20 years of service to the city and especially its residents in need.

In September a contingent of city employees and leaders visited Human Concerns to present DeBoer with a certificate of recognition, flowers and chocolates ... and most of all to says "thanks" for her critical work in serving those who have immediate and dire needs through the city's food pantry. The visit by members of the city's fire, police, administration and elected officials was a surprise to DeBoer. She also said it was humbling, heartfelt and "very thoughtful."

South Milwaukee Schools Superintendent Dr. Deidre Roemer is fully aware of the unique connection Human Concerns brings to many students across the city's schools.

"Human Concerns plays such an important role in the School District of South Milwaukee. Our mission is to remove barriers to education for all students, and Human Concerns accomplishes that mission beyond the support our teachers and staff provide," Roemer said.

Roemer highlighted Human Concerns' work in providing 170 of South Milwaukee students with school supplies, and at Christmas she said Human Concerns helps parents and caregivers by providing more than 700 of the community's young people with holiday gifts.

"We know that students' learning is improved when they feel connected to their community and have a resource for their basic needs," she said.

Roemer added, "Each autumn our students organize and participate in a food drive to give back to their city, and help those in need. Human Concerns is an important community partner in that effort, and last year alone, our students donated nearly 7,000 items during the annual food drive. We are extremely grateful for the school district and Human Concerns partnership. Our five-year strategic plan calls for an increase in community engagement, and our partnership with this vital organization is a model as we work to integrate our students and schools into the community."
